For purposes of this indicator, drinking 5 or more drinks on a single occasion was considered heavy drinking.

Highlights:

- Overall, 22.0% of residents in the WHR consume large quantities of alcohol (5 or more drinks, 12 times or more per year). This compares to 20.1% for Canada and 22.9% for Manitoba.
- The percentage of males consuming 5 or more drinks, 12 times or more in the past year is almost three times higher than that for females in the WHR, 31.4% for males and 11.5% for females. This is similar for both Manitoba and Canada where the males rate is approximately three times that of females.
