Highlights:

- A low percentage of the population contacting health professionals about mental health may indicate a reluctance to seek help for mental health issues than service availability or prevalence of mental health problems in the population.
- Women in Winnipeg are 2.4 times more likely to consult with a health care professional about mental health than are men (9.0% vs 3.9%). This proportion is similar for Manitoba (9.0% vs 3.8%) but lower for Canada (11.0% vs 5.4%).
- Compared to Canada, significantly fewer residents in the WHR have consulted with a health professional about their mental health in the past 12 months (8.2% vs 6.6%).
